SESSION 1 – TIME MANAGEMENT

Ms Tina Sethi, Psychologist and Trainer at a leading Management Training Institute - MBAGuru Institute started her session with sharing the examples of some renowned leaders those who achieved the margin of success in their fields by managing their time well. She helped students by listing some strategies that can be used to achieve effective time management. The workshop involved various activities like “identify a minute” and “calculate the time”. The activities targeted on teaching the students on how to keep a track on time while doing their jobs. She helped students to prepare their time table by giving time slots to various activities that all students have to perform. She emphasized on keeping time for all the activities proportionately by not just devoting entire time to academics or hobby related activities throughout the day. SHAKESPEARE'S DAY 2019

This activity inspired students to study literature in a more interesting way and provided all the students a platform to be a confident speaker.

Journey of handloom in India

The handloom was derived about 2000 years ago and was brought to England by the Roman. The process consisted of interlacing one set of the reach of yarn with another. The warp threads are stretched lengthwise in the weaving loom. The weft, the cross -threads are woven into the warp to make the cloth. There are two types of semi-automatic looms, namely, slug motion type and treadle type. A handloom is after woven on a shuttle-pit loom made from ropes, wooden beams and pales. The handloom is made from silk or cotton threads. Traditionally the process of threads dying and warping were outsourced and sizing, attaching the warp, weft winding, and weaving were done by the weaver. In India it is brought by the Prime Minister Shri Narendra Modi launched the India handloom Brand at Chennai on August 7, 2015 as part of the first ever national handloom day celebration. India has more than 500 specialized handloom weaving clusters spread across the country the handloom Sector is the second largest economic activity after agricultural which involves nearly 30 lakh weavers. It contributes nearly 22% of cloth produced in the country. The handloom industry belongs to the Pre-independence period and the new economic policy in India is implemented to trust this industry. Indian handloom holds a unique place in the world, accounting for nearly 95% of Indians to boycott all British products and uses only those made in India.

The great Indian literature

Indian literature refers to the literature produced on the Indian subcontinent until 1947 and in the republic of India thereafter. The republic of India has 22 officially recognized languages. The earliest works of Indian literature begin with the oral literature of the Rig Veda a collection of sacred hymns dating to the period 1500-1200 BCE. The Sanskrit epics Ramayana and Mahabharata appeared towards the end of the 2nd millennium BCE, as did the Tamil Sangam literature and the Puranic canon. In the medieval period, literature in Kannada and Telugu appeared in the 9th and 11th centuries respectively. Later literature in Marathi, Odia and Bengali appeared. Thereafter literature in various dialects of Hindi, Persian and Urdu began to appear as well. Early in the 20th century, Bengali poet Rabindranath Tagore became India's first Nobel laureate in literature, there are two major literary awards there are two major literary awards; there are Sahitya Akademi fellowship and the Jnanpith award eight Jnanpith awards each have been awarded in Hindi and Kannada, six in Bengali and Malayalam, four in Odia, four in Gujarati, Marathi, Telugu, and Urdu.

GST - One Nation One Tax

GST (goods and service tax) is an indirect tax used in India on the supply of goods and services. The GST bill was made by finance ministers of BJP and was implemented on 1st July 2017. Objective of GST is to improve the competitiveness of the original goods and services thereby improving GDP rate too.

GST is one of the indirect taxes for the whole nation, which will make India a unified common market. It is a single tax supply of goods and services right from the manufacturers to the customers. GST works as an 'all in one' tax as the various indirect taxes being levied by the center and state are included in GST. India's lawmakers believe that GST will have a very positive outcome on macroeconomic indicators. Both export and foreign direct investments are expected to grow.

There are three types of GST – CGST, SGST AND IGST. CGST AND SGST are levied on the trade which takes place within the geographical boundaries of the country whereas IGST is levied on the trade with other countries. GST is divided into 5 different tax slabs for collection of tax – 0%, 5%, 12%, 18% and 28%. GST is also collected from the point of consumption from the point of origin like previous taxes.

Foreign relations of India

The Ministry of external affairs of India (MEA) also known as the Foreign Ministry, is the government agency responsible for the conduct of foreign relations of India. With the world's third largest military expenditure, second largest armed force, fifth largest economy by national rates, third largest economy by nominal rates and third largest economy in terms of purchasing power parity.

India is the regional power, a nuclear power, a nascent global power and a potential superpower. India has growing international affairs.

India faces serious economic and social issues as a result of centuries of economic exploitation by colonial powers. However, since gaining independence from Britain in 1947, India has become a newly industrialized country, has a history of collaboration with several countries, is a component of BRICS and a major part of the developing world. India was one of the founding members of several international organizations, the United Nations, the Asian Development Bank, New Development Bank and G-20 and the founder of the Non-Aligned Movement.

India has also played an important and influential role in other international organizations like East Asia Summit, World Trade Organization, International Monetary Fund (IMF), G8+5 and IBSA Dialogue Forum. India is also a member of the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank and the Shanghai Cooperation Organization.

Regionally, India is a part of SAARC and BIMSTEC. India has taken part in several UN peacekeeping missions and in 2007 it was the second largest troop contributor to the United Nations. India is currently seeking a permanent seat in the UN Security Council along with the other G4 nations.

India wields enormous influence in global affairs and can be classified as an emerging superpower.
